To Help You Remember



1. Jesus taught us by his life, ministry, suffering, Death, Resurrection, and Ascension.
2. In today's Gospel, Jesus does not preach a long sermon in order to teach about the power of God. He teaches about God's power by healing a man with an unclean spirit.
3. The people saw that Jesus taught with authority.

Key Teachings



Teaching with Authority

The people of Jesus' time recognized that he taught with authority. Jesus knew what he was talking about, and this got the people's attention.

Teaching with Effect

Jesus' teaching still has an effect on people. His teaching inspires, encourages, challenges, and points the way to the Kingdom of God.

Teaching with Results

Jesus' teaching bears results. His teaching leads to healing and fullness of life in the heavenly kingdom.

Faith Words



This week's Faith Words describe two bodies of knowledge from which the Church draws her teaching.

Sacred Scripture

Sacred Scripture means "holy writings." Sacred Scripture is the collection of all the writings that God has inspired authors to write in his name.

Sacred Tradition

The word tradition means "to pass on." Sacred Tradition passes on what God has told us. It is the teaching of the Church that has been passed down to us from Jesus to the Church through the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit guides the Church, through the pope and the bishops, to teach us about God.

With My Family



We Listen

In Jesus' time, if someone had an "unclean spirit," it meant that an evil force possessed the person. Remember, in those days, people did not understand mental illness and other types of diseases. And maybe the man was truly possessed by an evil force. What the Gospel story tells us is this: Jesus has the power and authority to overcome all evil.

We Believe

The Church continues Jesus' teaching mission. The Holy Spirit gives the Church the authority to teach in Jesus' name. By proclaiming Sacred Scripture and by passing on Sacred Tradition, the Church helps us to grow in our understanding of God.

We Live As Disciples

None of us has the authority of Moses or Jesus! But our words and actions can teach others about God's love for us. What can you do for a friend, a classmate, or a complete stranger to teach about God's love?
