Repent
The serpent's voice can enter into our minds as we calculate our circumstances. The voice of temptation insinuates that we can do without God or his ways.
The Tempter's seductive voice says we can cast aside our relationship with the Creator, and come away unscathed. It says we know better than the One who made us.
We are often faced with temptation in whatever form it comes to us, and we sometimes decide to follow its promptings. We end up excluding God from our lives, rupturing our relationship with God, or disobeying divine Law and the moral norms God has given us.

For Reflection . . .
*Why does sin sometimes hold such sway over us?
From what sin(s) do you seek release and pardon?
When and why have you doubted God's Word?*

Renew
Christ succeeded where Adam failed. Christ refused temptation. For his bread as the Only-Begotten Son was the Word of God. His entire life was in obedience to the Father. The mantle of glory which covered Christ was service.

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Church Teaching: Christ, the New Adam

We cannot escape from the effects of sin alone. We need help. We need a savior. The Good News has been revealed to the world. Jesus Christ is the Savior and he is the embodiment of God's generous mercy to sinners. He is the New Adam, who makes right what went wrong when our first parents sinned against God and his command. Jesus Christ is the New Adam, who offers us an escape from the prison of our own making.

God's grace enables us to confront sin in our lives. With God's help we are able to see our sins and admit our faults. Without that admission we cannot progress toward holiness. Similar to a doctor who probes the wound before treating it, God, through his Word and Spirit, casts a probing and sometimes painful light on our personal sin. Conversion demands an interior judgment that we have sinned in real ways that necessitates real pardon from God.

The Church helps us in reconciliation. The first type of Church activity that promotes reconciliation is prayer, including the intercessory prayer of Mary and the Saints. Another activity is preaching. A third activity is the personal pastoral action aimed at helping an individual return to a healthy and holy relationship with God. Finally, the Church's own witness to the need for continual purification and renewal within and among her members promotes reconciliation.

Distinctiveness of Church Teaching

Saint Augustine of Hippo says that "God creates us without us, however, he does not save us without us." We have a conscience that must be employed as we contemplate how Jesus saves us and how each of us needs that Salvation.

Acknowledging our sins is the first step in acknowledging the power, love, and mercy of God. It is also a protection against future temptation.

Key Images and Symbols of the Season

TEMPTATION—by which we stumble and fall.

SIN—which weighs us down and keeps us from God.

GRACE—the sheer gift of God's goodness to us; it buoys us up into authentic life.

THE NEW ADAM—Jesus Christ, in whom we are recreated as true adopted sons and daughters of God.

RIGHTEOUSNESS—by which we are accounted as living for God alone.
