Insight

Where is human fulfillment found? Are we ever really complete?

Something Bigger

Each of us has a sense that there is more to life than merely one’s own self. We gather together in groups to pursue various aspects of life. Even so, our network of relationships—our family, friends, and other groups to which we belong—do not offer us complete fulfillment.

A beautiful sunset can cause an ache within us. The quiet voice within our heart whispers to us and an inner dialogue ensues. A grand initiative made up of many groups and peoples calls us to be our best self. It is almost as if there is something built within us that draws us beyond ourselves into something that is bigger than we are.

We Are Seekers

We have not created ourselves. God created us. The imprint of the Creator is found in his creatures. We are called to know and love the One who made us.

Through our openness to truth and beauty, our sense of right and wrong, our desire for something more beyond ourselves, and our search for happiness, we are drawn to God and seek him. Without the Creator we are nothing, we lack grounding, we are without a center—we are rudderless.

The Soul Is the Seed of Eternity

God provides us with a link to himself and to immortality by giving each of us a soul. When the body dies, the soul does not, it continues to exist.

We cultivate our truest self when we nourish the soul spiritually by embracing belief, by establishing a firm religious practice, and by participating actively in the Church. Our vocation in this world can only be found through God.
